Oita has long been the Japan's gateway to the outside world and its culture. The first Christian mission from Portugal to Japan arrived in Oita in the 16th century. Oita is rich in natural resources and is culturally diverse.

Oita is well known for having the largest number of hot springs in Japan and a warm climate

Oita also produces an abundant variety of products, and is famous for its beautiful maritime resorts. In many ways, Oita is comparable to San Diego, the site of the last Grassroots Summit in 2014. A great number of volunteers are all waiting to greet you in Oita.

# The Beginning of Japan - America Grassroots Exchange

In 1841, an American whaling boat rescued five shipwrecked Japanese fishermen who were marooned on a remote Pacific island. Among the five was a fourteen year old boy called Manjiro. Manjiro's intelligent good nature soon earned him great respect among the American crew. He was given the name John, and taken back to Fairhaven Massachusetts to receive an American education. Under the care of the ship's captain William H. Whitfield, Manjiro studied not only English, science and navigation, but also about American culture and values, such as freedom, democracy and hospitality.

At that time Japan was under the rule of the Tokugawa Shogunate, whose policy of isolationism meant that leaving the country was an offense punishable by death. After 10 years in America, however, Manjiro was determined to return home, to pass on the knowledge and goodwill he had received from Whitfield and the community of Fairhaven. Not long after Manjiro returned to Japan, Commodore Perry arrived calling for an end to isolationism, an event which lead to the birth of modern Japan. John Manjiro played a crucial role in these events, introducing and explaining American culture, values, technology, etc., to the Japanese.

The friendship between John Manjiro and Captain Whitfield has resulted in more than 170 years of friendship between their descendents. Members of the Whitfield and Nakahama families play a pivotal role in the Summits, and serve as a reminder of the enormous potential of grassroots exchange.

# What is **Grassroots Exchange?**

"Grassroots exchange" is what happens when ordinary citizens of different countries meet and make friendships with each other. Through participating in cultural activities and staying in each other's homes, they discover much about the other person's culture and way of life. It is our hope that "grassroots exchange" will lead to increased mutual understanding, respect and friendship between different countries.

The "Japan-America Grassroots Summit" is an annual gathering that provides an opportunity for such an exchange and is held alternately in Japan and the U.S. The program includes homestays, sight-seeing, and various cultural activities. During the Summit, citizens from both countries have the opportunity to get to know each other, have fun, and deepen their friendships.

People of all ages and backgrounds participate in the summit, but they all have one thing in common: a desire to create stronger ties and greater understanding between the people of Japan and America.

# **Beppu Suginoi Hotel**

### Stay on July 7 and 8

Beppu Suginoi is a spa resort hotel located on the hill top called Kankaiji, one of the 8 hot spring areas of Beppu city. It offers stunning view of nature as far as Shikoku Island over the Beppu bay on a sunny day on one side, and Mt. Tsurumi on the other. Suginoi consists of 3 buildings, which are Hon-kan (Main Wing), Hana-kan (Hana Wing), and Naka-kan (Middle Wing), hot springs, restaurants, banquet halls, meeting rooms, Karaoke rooms, and spa salon, "Spa the Ceada". Suginoi also offers many other amusement facilities, such as an open air hot spring, "Tanayu", an open air swimsuit hot spring facility, "The Aqua Garden", the bowling alley, amusement swimming pool, "Aquabeat", the game center, and souvenir shops.



# **Oita Oasis Tower Hotel**

### Stay on July 12

Oita Oasis Tower Hotel is a modern hotel in Oita City. It is located in the "Oita Oasis Tower," the highest building in the city, which houses the cultural center and shopping mall. The tower will be connected with the Oita Prefectural Art Museum (OPAM) to be opened in April 2015.

It also houses the prefectural musical theater and the NHK broadcast station. The hotel is only one kilometer from JR Oita railway station and 60 kilometers from Oita airport.


# Local Tour Choice on July 8



# Beppu Learning Course \$40

"Japan Sun Industries" is a Social Welfare Organizaion which is providing jobs to handicapped people, collaborating with major Japanese companies. Their motto is "No charity, but the chance!"

# **Local Sessions**




One of the best features of the Grassroots Summit is the "local sessions (homestay program)."

In Oita, the local sessions will start on July 9th for 4 days and 3 nights. The participants will experience person-to-person exchange and the unique local culture with their host families. There are 11 local session areas in Oita.

# 1 Oita City

In the sixteenth century, under the protection of the Christian Daimyo(feudal lord), Otomo Sourin, Oita became a center for Christian missionaries and Western culture blossomed here. Medicine, music, and drama from the West also flourished in Oita. Oita City is now developed as a center of trade and industry, playing an important role as the largest economic heart of eastern Kyushu. It is surrounded by the beautiful Beppu Bay, and at the popular "Umi Tamago" aquarium, guests can see fun performances from dolphins, walruses and more. Visitors can also see groups of wild Japanese monkeys nearby at the Mt. Takasaki Natural Park.





Since 1990, Oita City has enjoyed a sister city relationship with Austin, Texas, U.S.A, and the two cities enjoy a deep friendship. I hope that all participants in this summit enjoy a wonderful experience in Oita City. We are all waiting to welcome you.

# Usuki City

Usuki is home to the Usuki Stone Buddhas. They were carved into the cliff face about one thousand years ago and are national treasures. Many people come to visit these statues. Furthermore in Usuki's urban areas, surrounding a sixteenth-century castle are Buddhist temples dating from the Edo Period, samurai residences, and many old merchants' houses (machiya). Looking at the view from the castle ruins is like going back in time to the Edo Period. Modern Usuki is famed for its "miso" and "soy sauce" production, but the area is also known for fishing and farming. For these reasons and more, there are many Japanese restaurants in Usuki, and visitors from all over Japan come to eat the delicious Japanese food here.







My name is Kensuke Ono and I am the vice president of the Usuki Chamber of Commerce and Industry. In a town like this, I hope that you will fully experience Japanese culture, and make many wonderful memories here. # 3 Tsukumi City

Tsukumi is a port city made up of interweaving orange fields and a unique sawtooth-shaped coastline.

It is famous for being a cement town, being one of Japan's prominent producers of limestone deposits. Furthermore, Tsukumi is a city of many charms, such as our traditional fan dance that has been performed for roughly 450 years, and opportunities to interact with dolphins.

We truly hope that our American guests taking part in the summit will fully enjoy Tsukumi City's nature and culture.

# 5 Taketa City

Taketa City is located in the south-west of Oita Prefecture, roughly in the center of Kyushu. It is surrounded by the mountains that Kyushu is well-known for: the Kuju mountain range, Mt. Aso, and the Sobo-Katamuki mountain range, and is an area rich in nature with water and greenery. Visitors will be delighted by the famous ever-flowing water of Taketa, Taketa's food which is borne of Taketa's rich nature and history, Nagayu Onsen, Japan's best carbonated onsen (hot spring) and the vast Kuju Highlands that give one a sense of openness. Furthermore, there are the Oka Castle Ruins, made famous by the music "The Moon over the Ruined Castle," and in the castle town there are many old samurai residences and other historical buildings.







My name is Kiyoko Hada and I am the vice president of the Okajo Historical Town Planning Society. I am looking forward to meeting you all in the castle town which is rich in nature and history.

# 6 Hita City

Hita City is surrounded by beautiful mountains (Aso, the Kuju mountain range and the Hiko mountain range), and the town is blessed by the wonderful water that flows from these mountain ranges. On summer nights, many Japanese houseboats float on the Mikuma River, and we invite you all to this enchanting world. Furthermore, from the olden days, Hita has flourished as an important place bringing together traffic from all over northern Kyushu. In the Edo period, the region prospered as the Saigokusuji County - an imperial fiefdom directly controlled by the Edo Shogunate, and so was the center of Kyushu's governmental, economic and cultural worlds. Even now this reputation remains unchanged, and the area is known as "Little Kyoto."







I am Kiyoshi Sakuragi. I have been operating an English language cram school for around 30 years. Every summer we run a program called "A Summer Adventure in Hita," during which American Students and local elementary & middle school pupils are able to meet, make friends, and experience all the charms of Hita. Hita is often called "Little Kyoto of Kyushu." I hope you will come to our town and experience traditional Japanese culture here.

# Nakatsu City

Nakatsu is famed for its connection to Fukuzawa Yukichi, whose portrait is featured on the ¥10,000 bank notes (Fukuzawa visited the U.S. along with John Manjiro in 1860). There are culturally important and historical buildings in the city, such as Nakatsu Castle and the former home of Fukuzawa. Nakatsu is also home to the famed scenic area, Yabakei, and rich in seafood (the conger eel is particularly famed). Its mountainous regions are home to shitake mushrooms, Bungo-beef, peaches, pears, green tea and lumber. Furthermore, Nakatsu is famous throughout Japan for its "Heavenly Kara-Age (Japanese fried chicken)".
